# **Program Notes**

# **Prelude**

"Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme" (Awake, the voice is calling us) is a Lutheran hymn written in 1598 by Philipp Nicolai. This hymn tune has been utilized by many different composers as source material for organ partitas, fantasias, chorale preludes, cantatas, and even symphonic overtures. The tune also will be heard later in the concert when the Elementary Honors Choir of Rock Hill Schools joins the Choral Society in the third movement of *Hodie* by Z. Randall Stroope. Johann Sebastian Bach's chorale prelude, BWV 645, is a transcription of the fourth movement of his cantata of the same name, BWV 140. This chorale prelude is one of the six *Schübler Chorales* (BWV 645-650), published in 1747.

"Carillon de Westminster" is from 24 pieces de fantasie, Opus 54, No. 6., by French composer and organist, Louis Vierne. This piece was composed in 1927 based upon an improvisation on the bells of Westminster Palace. The bells of B, E, F#, and G# ring in various patterns on the quarter hour, and these variations are heard in increasing intensity throughout this exciting and virtuosic work.

#### Part I

"Weinachten" (Christmas), from Felix Mendelssohn's *Sechs Sprüche*, is the first in a set of six anthems which were composed for liturgical use. Each piece is relatively short, and "Weinachten" shines with eight intertwined a cappella voice parts. The harmonies throughout this piece are quintessential Mendelssohn, and the cascading "Hallelujahs" reflect the permeating and endless joy of Christmas.

**Personent Hodie** is an adaptation of a sacred song of the same name as published in *Piæ Cantiones* by compiler Jacobus Finno in 1582. In this twenty-first century arrangement by Lara Hoggard, the Christmas story proceeds from the Savior's birth in the manger, to the offering of gifts to the Christ-child by three Magi, and finally to songs of praise from the heavenly host and people on earth alike, finishing with a resounding "Glory to God in the highest."

"There Shall a Star from Jacob Come Forth" is a movement from Mendelssohn's unfinished oratorio, *Christus*, Opus 97. The work was published posthumously and first performed in 1852. The first part of this well-loved staple of choral literature is based on Old Testament text from Numbers 24:17, "a star shall come out of Jacob, and a sceptre shall rise out of Israel," and Psalm 2:9, "You shall break them with a rod of iron; You shall dash them to pieces." The concluding portion of the movement consists of a sixteenth-century chorale by Philipp Nicolai, "Wie shön leuchtet der Morgenstern," or "How brightly shines the Morning Star."

Tomorrow Shall Be My Dancing Day utilizes the text of an English carol which

has been set by many composers, including Holst, Stravinsky, Rutter, and Willcocks. Gardner's arrangement includes the first four verses of the carol and focuses on Jesus' life from birth through baptism. The text speaks in the voice of Jesus, who repeatedly calls followers to "his dance" as his "true love." This piece is strophic in form, and the multi-meter verses are set to a playful and rhythmic accompaniment reflecting the ebullient and sometimes humorous text.

O Radiant Dawn was written in 2007 by Scottish composer James MacMillan. This piece is a setting of a sixth-century communion antiphon for December 21. The antiphon is, in turn, a combination of text from Luke 1:78-79, which is Zechariah's prophesy about Jesus after the birth of John the Baptist – "the dawn from on high will break upon us, to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death" – and Isaiah 9:2 – "the people who walked in darkness have seen a great light." It is interesting to note that the antiphon, which is sung on the shortest day of the year, prepares for the "Splendour of Eternal Light." This lush and evocative a cappella setting concludes with a contemplative and repeated "Amen."

**Rejoice and be merry,** also known as "Gallery Carol," is a 2004 composition by English composer John Rutter. The piece includes brass, percussion, and organ and utilizes the rhythmic device of hemiola, or three beats into two, on the text "his praises, his praises we'll sing." The rollicking melody embodies the good cheer of the season, and the piece finishes with a resounding "Rejoice!"

### Part II

**Angels We Have Heard on High** is derived from an eighteenth-century French carol, "Les anges dans nos compagnes." In 1862 the melody was adapted by English Bishop James Chadwick, and today the tune is commonly known as GLORIA. This setting, by William Atwood, features an introduction with dialogue between upper and lower brass, which is then joined by the organ and voices of the choir and audience.

Hand Me Down My Silver Trumpet is a delightful piece and an excellent tool for teaching two-part harmony to young singers due to the call and response nature of the refrain. Call and response is a compositional technique that utilizes two phrases in a conversational back-and-forth style. This playful tune was written by Joy Webb, an officer in the Salvation Army, and, in addition to the next selection, is performed for us today by the Elementary Honors Choir of Rock Hill Schools.

In the Dark of December is based on Oliver Herford's "I Heard a Bird Sing," a brief poem with text reminding us that in the dark, wintry days of December, we are approaching spring. This is a text of hope. Utilizing Herford's poem, composer and vocal music educator Lon Beery wrote a lovely, flowing tune for two-part treble voices, piano, and flute utilizing the Dorian mode, a scale very similar to minor but with a raised sixth.

Joy to the World is one of the most popular and enduring of Christmas carols. The text was written by Isaac Watts, and the tune was adapted by Lowell Mason from a melody by George Frideric Handel. This arrangement, by American composer, conductor, and organist David Cherwein, modulates to the dominant on the third verse and returns to the tonic key with descanting voices on the final verse. The audience is encouraged to join the singing on verses 1, 2, and 4.

## Part III

Hodie (This Day) expresses the rejoicing of the angels on the day of Christ's birth through approximately 15 minutes of dynamic music featuring organ, brass, percussion, and choir. Composer Z. Randall Stroope wrote this second edition of the work in three untitled movements. Whereas the first and third movements are full of soaring resonances and energetic, rhythmic vitality, the second movement is gentler and more contemplative, creating a peaceful contrast to what precedes and follows it. Using English and Latin, Stroope made the composition's text macaronic - written in two languages. To further combine historical and contemporary, he incorporated texts based on poetry and liturgy. The text of the first movement is built on a short fragment of a 1629 poem, "On the Morning of Christ's Nativity," written by English poet John Milton. In the second and third movements, Stroope used text from the liturgy of the vesper service for Christmas day. Finally, what Stroope called the "diamond in the crown" of the work is the familiar "Wake, awake for Night is Flying" text of Philipp Nicolai's "Wachet auf," found in the third movement and heard earlier in the organ prelude to this concert. The York County Choral Society is thrilled to have the Elementary Honors Choir of Rock Hill Schools join us for the last movement of this vibrant, joyful work.

Festival First Nowell is composer Dan Forrest's setting of the familiar seventeenth-century English carol "The First Nowell" and was commissioned by Westminster Choir College for the 2013 Readings and Carols service in Princeton Chapel. Though neither the author of the carol's text nor the source of the tune is definitive, the carol first appeared with nine stanzas in the second edition of Davis Gilbert's *Ancient Christmas Carols* in 1823. In 1833, it appeared with an altered text in William Sandys' *Christmas Carols, Ancient and Modern*, and in 1871, John Stainer published the modern arrangement of the carol with which audiences are familiar. The text of this beautiful carol is based on the Gospel accounts of the events surrounding the birth of Jesus found in Matthew 2 and Luke 2. The Choral Society invites the audience to join the singing of verses 1 and 3 of this stunning arrangement.

Glory, Glory to the Newborn King is an a cappella composition that conveys the wonder of Jesus' birth in a humble manger followed by the joyful proclamation of this good news. Composer and arranger Moses Hogan based this piece on the spiritual "Go Tell It on the Mountain" but added his own text and music both to set the scene at the beginning of the piece and to incorporate his trademark style of rhythmic and melodic layering toward the end. York County Choral Society tenor Tyler Lewis is our soloist for this energetic, jubilant spiritual.

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# Musical Staff & Featured Performers

Elizabeth Mixon, Co-Artistic Director/Conductor Mrs. Elizabeth Mixon was appointed Co-Artistic Director and Conductor of the York County Choral Society in August 2023. She served as an educator in the South Carolina public school system for 31 years with 18 of those years in choral music education and 13 years in leadership and test administration.

Following one year of elementary teaching and eight at the middle school level, Elizabeth joined the faculty of Northwestern High School where she served as the Visu-

al and Performing Arts Department chairman from 2002-2007. Under her direction from 1999-2008, the Northwestern High School Troubadours of Rock Hill ranked first in six of the South Carolina Music Educators Association (SCMEA) AAAA yearly festivals and, by audition, regularly placed numerous students into the South Carolina All State Choirs. In addition to their popular Winter and Spring multi-evening concerts and yearly performance trips, Troubadours served as a demonstration choir for the 2004 American Choral Directors Association Convention (Nashville, TN) and a 2007 guest choir for the SCMEA convention (Charleston, SC). In the 2003-2004 school year, Elizabeth guided the process to Northwestern High School being named a 2004 National Grammy Signature School of Excellence in the Arts.

A South Carolina lowcountry native and resident of Rock Hill, SC, since 1988, Elizabeth holds a Bachelor of Music degree in Voice Performance from Furman University (Greenville, SC), a Master of Music Degree in Choral Conducting from the Eastman School of Music (Rochester, NY), and a Master of Arts in Teaching in Music Education degree from Winthrop University (Rock Hill, SC). She studied voice with Ms. Gail Schoonmaker, Dr. Trudy Fuller, and Dr. Carol Allred and conducting with Dr. Bigham Vick, Jr., and Mr. Donald Neuen, both of whom she credits as being instru-



mental in building her technique and leadership skills as well as her understanding of ensemble growth and development. Elizabeth has served as clinician for the South Carolina Music Educators Association SSA clinic, the Rock Hill School District Middle School Honors Choir, and the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship of SC and the Presbyterian Association of Musicians' Festival by the Sea. Staying true to her roots, she is an active church musician at Ebenezer Presbyterian Church, Associate Reformed. She and her husband, Ben, have two adult daughters, both of whom live in Rock Hill.

# Randy Imler, Co-Artistic Director/Conductor

An active musician for more than 35 years, Dr. Randy Imler has served as Director of Music at Ebenezer Associate Reformed Presbyterian (ARP) Church in Rock Hill, Steele Creek Presbyterian (PC-USA) Church in Charlotte, and St. Stephen's Lutheran (ELCA) Church in Lexington, SC. Randy was an adjunct professor of music at Winthrop University from 2007-2014, conducting the Collegiate Choir and Jazz Voices. He was elected to the Winthrop Board of Trustees in 2014 and works as Executive Director of the Catawba Regional



Council of Governments, a regional planning and economic development organization.

Randy holds Bachelor of Arts and Master of Music degrees from Winthrop University, where he studied with Jerry Helton, Donald Rogers, and Robert Edgerton. He earned Master of Business Administration and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees (conducting) from the University of South Carolina, where he studied with Larry Wyatt and David O'Shields. While at USC, he won first place in the 2007 USC Graduate School Competition, Performing Arts Category, with a performance of choral arrangements derived from William Walker's *Southern Harmony*.

Randy has prepared choirs for major works including the combined USC choirs for performance of Mozart's *Davidde Penitente* (K. 469) with the South Carolina Philharmonic Orchestra. While at Winthrop he prepared and conducted the Collegiate Choir and University Orchestra in Faure's *Requiem in d minor* (Op. 48). Under his direction, the Winthrop Jazz Voices were a featured ensemble at multiple SC Allstate Choral Festivals. Church choirs under his leadership have been included in the Presbyterian Church-USA National General Assembly and the Billy Graham crusades. Randy also has served as a clinician of York County honors choirs and as an adjudicator of choirs at the Carowinds Festival of Music.

Randy and his wife, Tracy, live in Tega Cay, SC. They have three adult children and enjoy spending time with family, on Lake Wylie, and at the beach.

# Zinorl Broñola, Accompanist

Mr. Broñola is currently an instructor/accompanist of various courses in Winthrop's Dept. of Theatre and Dance, an accompanist for the Winthrop Chorale, and serves as the Director of Music at Epworth United Methodist Church and Cornerstone United Methodist Church in Rock Hill, SC and the Lifenotes Band Director at St Philip Neri Catholic Church in Fort Mill, SC for their contemporary mass. He earned an MM in piano performance (Winthrop University) and a BA in piano performance from the Bulgarian State Academy of Music. He is a native of Manila, Philippines, and



throughout his young adult years has won prestigious awards and distinctions both nationally and internationally as a solo pianist. His achievements include winning first prize at the 1981 National Music Competitions for Young Artists and the 1990 International Piano Competition for Young Pianists held in Marsala, Sicily, Italy. Mr. Broñola also is the recipient of the 1990 Young Achievers' Award in Music which was awarded to him by the National Commission on Culture and the i^rts in Manila, and he was featured as a guest artist on Philippine radio/television on many occasions. He was discovered by then-First Lady of the Philippines, Imelda Marcos, was invited frequently to perform at the presidential palace, and in 1982 he was invited to be part of her delegation (as a solo artist) to Russia, Morocco, and the United States. His other performances abroad include concerts in Bulgaria, Poland, and Italy, where he was featured both by the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Philippine Embassy in Rome. After completing his master's degree in 2005 at Winthrop, he has continually played an active part in the life of the university and the surrounding communities through performance in solo/collaborative music, accompanying statewide festivals (both in choral music and dance and for Charlotte Ballet) and has directed/ accompanied several musical theater productions at Winthrop University and for the Rock Hill Community Theater.



# Dr. Shirley Fishburne

With the help of many talented and faithful singers, Shirley Fishburne and David Lowry founded the York County Choral Society over forty years ago. Shirley is excited about the new leadership of the group and is honored to be the organist for today's program. She earned bachelor's and master's degrees in organ performance from Winthrop University and also holds an Ed.D. from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. Fishburne taught music at Winthrop for 17 years, in addition to teaching at other area colleges and schools, and she also has served several churches in Rock Hill as organist and choirmaster. She and her husband, Coty, have been devoted supporters of YCCS. After his death, Shirley moved to the Philadelphia area to be near one of their daughters and her family. Philadelphia is where she lives, but Rock Hill will always be home.

Tyler Lewis, tenor, holds a bachelor's degree in music and master's degrees in business administration and music (choral conducting) from Winthrop University. While at Winthrop, Lewis was a member of the Winthrop Chorale and the Winthrop Chamber Singers, and he participated in the university's opera productions. Lewis also conducts and plays organ, and he has served as an organist at Ebenezer ARP Church in Rock Hill since 2017. He also is employed as a Commercial Lending Officer and Brownfields Program Manager at the Catawba Regional Council of Governments. Active in the community and as a soloist, Tyler recently presented a solo recital for the Rock Hill Music Club, and he serves on the Board of the York County Choral Society.
